A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

No one likes talking about money. No one likes thinking that their church is "only" interested in them for their money. I once had an elder whose husband never came to church. He had been very active in his home church, his wife explained, just like his parents. Then his father became very ill. As his father lay dying, representatives of the church came to persuade this dying man to make a sizable donation to the church. My parishioner's husband was appalled. He vowed never to trust church people again. These are the stories that sour us to talking about money in the church. But we must.

It is said that more than any other subject, Jesus taught about money. Jesus had no love for money. Jesus taught about money because it was a way to address what people valued. After all, we give our money (and our time, skills, talents) to what we truly care about. My guess is that if Jesus walked amongst us, he would have much to say on what an idol we make of money today.

As I write this article, we are approaching both Stewardship Sunday and Reformation Sunday. On Reformation Sunday Protestant churches like ours remember our history. Our branch of the Christian family sprouted during the 16th Century. Money played a role in the debates at that time. Our founders believed the church was skipping over all Jesus's lessons on money and idol making. Asking people to pay indulgences, a fee to be forgiven for their sins, was NOT in line with the teachings of Jesus. Hoarding money for golden sanctuaries was not why the church existed. The church needed to be reformed. And so, we celebrate Reformation Sunday and remind ourselves of the Church's true calling and that we should invest all that we in Jesus' cause of justice and compassion - of God's kingdom come near.

No one likes to talk about money. The truth is our financial situation at the First Presbyterian Church of Easton is not as strong as it could be. Our income is down. Our spending is efficient. But we have expenses - a tree in front of the church which needs to be removed, for example. Our property and finance teams are being good stewards of the resources we have. We are using our building for more income - this month the non-profit Recovery Specialists will rent our fellowship hall several days a week from 9am to 4pm. Still, we are stretched. We have a huge mortgage and are using our cash reserves. Money is something we will need to talk about honestly.

And yet even as we face challenges, this small congregation does more than some churches twice our size do. The refrain I hear from our current active membership: Small but Mighty. I see it as you fill the Blessing Box week after week and feed hungry neighbors. Small but Mighty. As worship began this past Sunday, Jacob Van Norman played the drum, the choir rose from their pews and walked with purpose and joy forward to lead us in song. The sanctuary was alive with God's presence! Small but Mighty. God continues to call us and use this church for good.

As our church approaches Stewardship Sunday, we know what we value. We have committed to learning from the past, but not dwelling in it. We embrace God's reforming Spirit. God calls us to forgiveness and to move forward. We wish to be a community connected by our trust in Christ. We know Christ has abided with us through so much. We trust God is with us now. We are committed to be a community who cares for each other and seeks to care for our neighbors in need. We wish to sing songs of thanksgiving to God. We wish to joyfully worship and share experiences which fill us with hope. And we wish to grow here in downtown Easton, so we can share what we know about God's goodness and love.

We cannot embrace our call and move forward without your financial support. So, I ask you about money... Do you pledge? Like every public radio station, we are asking you to be a sustaining member who gives regularly to support the mission of this church. Even in these hard times, could you give at a level which reflects your commitment to this church's mission and future?

Thank you for all you have invested in this community of faith in the past, and all you are doing and will do to ensure we are following Jesus Christ today.

A.M.E.N. UPDATE ACTION – MEDITATION – EDUCATION – NEW HABITS MISSION 22-23, JOINING HANDS TO SUPPORT CHILDREN

Did you know?

Guns became the leading cause of death among children and teens in 2020, killing more people ages 1 to 19 in the U.S. than vehicle crashes, drugs overdoses or cancer. More than 4,300 died of firearm-related injuries that year — a 29 percent increase from 2019. (NBC News)

Until recently, motor vehicle accidents were the number one cause of accidental death in these children and youth. But in recent years, gun-related injuries surpassed motor vehicle accidents as the most common cause of death in youths and children, and this number continues to increase each year. (Forbes)

WHY IS THIS A MATTER OF FAITH?

Jesus loved children. Jesus said, "And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me." The lives of children are precious to God.

WHAT CAN WE DO?

More Americans than ever before now own guns. This means more children are exposed to guns in their homes, in the homes of relatives and friends, and out in the world.

Consider **Gun Buyback** campaigns and let others know about them. Northampton's District Attorney's office held a gun buyback program in early October 2022. Residents received grocery gift cards ranging from \$50-\$200 for guns they no longer wanted. Over 300 firearms were successfully collected. While buyback programs don't usually lower gun violence connected with criminal activity, they can help get guns out of homes where children may have access. Accidental shootings and access to guns to aid in suicide attempts can be prevented.

Consider gun safety. Campaigns like **97percent (www.97percent.us)** and **Be Smart for Kids** (besmartforkids.org) are trying to move beyond the hot button rhetoric around guns. They advocate for responsible gun ownership, safe storage, and being pro-active in conversations with relatives and friends about guns in the home. Northwell Health recently aired the 30 second gun safety spot called **Ferocious Tiger (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xjeY6-Ls0qM)**. "Much like you ask the parent of your child's friend about food allergies, or if there is a pool, you should also ask if there is a gun in the home," said president and CEO of Northwell Health.


We have made our final purchases of medical supplies that will reach Ukraine early in November. The medical teams are in desperate need for these paramedic kits to care for civilians and soldiers on the front lines. These supplies have been purchased through a disabled veteran owned-small business that gave us a terrific price which we could not match anywhere else. Again, we have been able to ship the supplies to Ukraine at no cost to us. 100% of the donations collected went to products and supplies that were specifically requested and needed for the Ukrainian soldiers and civilians.

This ministry has been a true gift to all of us who were able to participate; I truly hope you all feel that way, as well. It helped us to not only share God's blessing with others, but it also reminds us that our Christian family is vast indeed, both near and far.
